

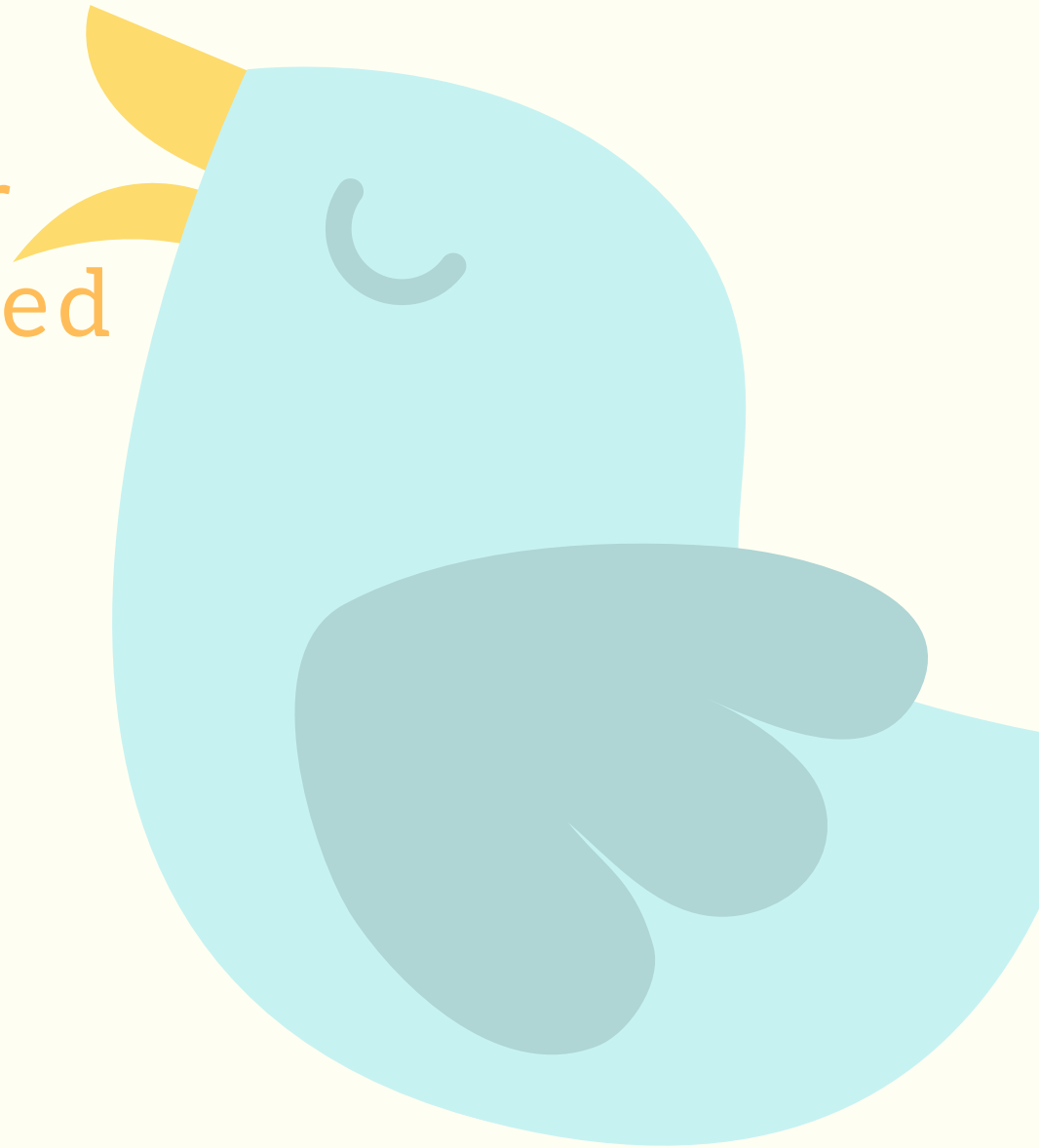


BACKYARD BIRDS

Orange Peel Bird Feeder

Materials

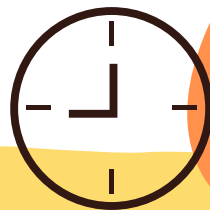
- 1 ripe orange
- Knife, spoon & scissors.
- Thin stick, such as a kabob skewer or plastic stirrer
- Strong cord or yarn

Steps

Ask an adult to help.

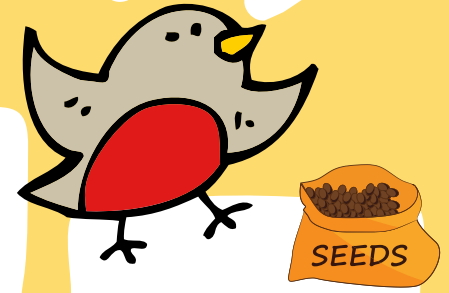
1. Cut an orange in half. You need only one half at a time.
2. Scoop out the flesh and eat it!

3. Poke a hole using a thin stick through the side of the peel. Don't get too close to the top or it will break. Do this on the other three sides of the orange. >>



Poke the holes at the 12, 3, 6 & 9 o'clock positions.

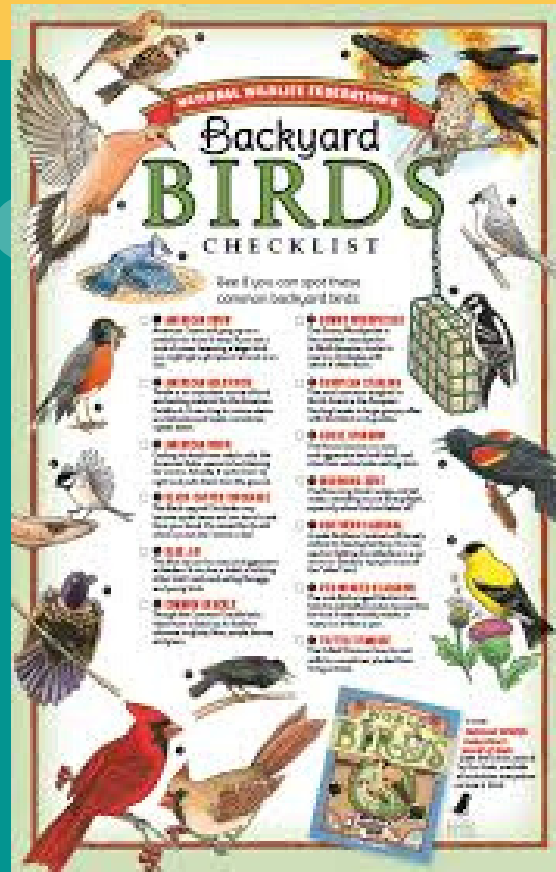
4. Cut four 10-inch pieces of yarn for each half piece of fruit. Then tie a knot at the end and thread each one through a hole.



5. Tie all four tops of the strings together in a knot. This is where you'll hang your feeder from a branch. Hang from a branch and fill with bird seed.
